Sociology is the study of the interaction between individuals and society, social change, and the social impact of human behavior. Sociologists investigate the structure of groups, organizations, and social institutions and how people interact within these contexts.

The sociology program at Transylvania offers courses on a wide range of topics alongside foundational courses in research methods, social theory, and inequalities. Individuals with training in sociology are valuable in all career sectors, as employers need people who understand the social world and how to work with diverse groups of people. Many students are surprised to learn that a sociology major or minor can lead to jobs in advertising, journalism, real estate, public health, and even the video game industry.
